- ➤ **KidsFest 2016 –** attended by 5067 people, with approximately 1,500 people visiting the RiverConnect, Parks Victoria and Goulburn Murray Landcare Network marquee. Event numbers were down on previous years due to persistent poor weather.
- ➤ Rakali Information Night 17 October 2016. As part of a tour funded by the Normal Wettenhall Foundation, RiverConnect facilitated a community information night presented by Geoff Williams from The Platypus Conservancy. The event attracted 11 attendees and was hosted at Shepparton Senior Citizens Centre.
- Spotlight Walks –Community walks lead by Goulburn Murray Landcare Network spotting various local nocturnal species along Goulburn River locations, with a total of six walks attracting 74 attendees.
- ➤ Clean Up Australia Day RiverConnect partnered with Greater Shepparton City Council's Waste team to hold three Clean Up Australia Day events, including a schools day, a business clean-up and a community clean-up.
- Art Along the River RiverConnect offered art sessions at the Australian Botanic Gardens on 27 February 2016. The class was aimed at beginner-intermediate skill levels featuring ceramics with Kaye Poulton. Participants made a number of ceramic pieces featuring indentations from sticks, leaves and other natural materials found on the ground nearby.
- ➤ Bat Walk and Talk —The now annual Bat Talk and discovery walk included a 1 hour information session followed by a bat walk with attendees introduced to bat detectors to locate bats in the river environment. The 32 attendees learned about local bats of Greater Shepparton and the various species around Australia with expert bat enthusiast, Robert Bender.
- ➤ Breakfast with the Birds RiverConnect hosted two opportunities as part of Activities in the Park for the community to discover the different types of birdlife in our riverine environment with RiverConnect and Birdlife Murray Goulburn members for a Bird Walk and Talk tour, followed by breakfast, including the popular new addition of a Shrove Tuesday pancake breakfast.
- Flats walk and bush tucker Uncle Leon Saunders lead another popular cultural walk on The

Flats. The 27 participants learnt about significant events and heard personal stories of life growing up on the banks of the Goulburn River before enjoying a traditional bush tucker inspired lunch.

- Photography Along The River RiverConnect and the Shepparton Camera Club offered a unique nature photography workshop at the Botanic Gardens as part of the Activities in the Park program. The basics workshop was suited to beginners or more experienced photographers looking to diversify their work, with the presenter particularly focussing on macro photography on flora and insects.
- ➤ Turtle Talk 27 January 2017. 46 participants discovered the freshwater turtles that live in our local waterways with experts from Turtles Australia. Turtles Australia exhibited live specimens and provided an engaging and interactive opportunity for people of all ages to improve their knowledge.
- ➤ Canoeing on the Goulburn Saturday 28 February 2017. RiverConnect offered this free 'Activities in the Park' event, supported by special guest Daniel Lovell from GB CMA to discuss environmental water and answer any questions participants may have. It provided a relaxing and informative experience for all ages for 50 participants over the two sessions.

Update of Access Map

The RiverConnect Access Map was updated by the Communications Working Group, in consultation with various stakeholders including the IAC and Council's Disability Access Officer to identify the accessibility of sites. Additional symbols were added to encourage various uses of the river environment, including canoeing, photography, birdwatching and interpretative signage. Boulevard Bush Reserve was also added as a location to encourage the use of the reserve with the new interpretative signage.

CONNECTING ENVIRONMENT

To protect, repair, enhance and sustain important river, wetland and forest environments, so that current and future generations can understand and enjoy natural river and red gum forest environments.

- Ongoing meeting of the Land Manager's Working Group to continue communication and collaboration on land management projects, including developing ideas around in-river litter traps.
- > Completed the final trial marker for the Boulevard Bush Reserve interpretative signage project as per the Boulevard Bush Reserve Environmental Management Plan.
- Partnered with Greater Shepparton City Council and Parks Victoria to run series of public awareness campaigns around anti-illegal dumping radio campaigns over long weekends and public holidays. Anecdotal evidence of decreased illegal dumping, but causation requires ongoing research and clear recording of data. Applied for, and await outcome of, illegal dumping grant to value of \$10,000.
- > Participation in Clean Up Australia Day with school, community and business clean ups:
 - Removing litter and illegal dumping from Shepparton Weir and Boulevard Bush Reserve area with 150 participants from local primary schools;
 - Removing litter and illegal dumping in business clean up with 12 participants;
 - Removing litter and illegal dumping at community clean up with 27 participants
- > 773.225 m.sq revegetation works by 8 schools (*Incomplete data regarding size of area revegetated)
- Promotion of environmental water flushes and the benefits of environmental water via Facebook and newsletters to improve community understanding.

CONNECTING ABORIGINAL PEOPLE

To provide programs, activities and facilities so that the whole community can understand and better appreciate the important historical and cultural significance this area holds for its traditional owners.

- Flats walk and bush tucker Uncle Leon Saunders and others lead a unique and memorable cultural walk on The Flats. Participants learnt about significant events and heard personal stories of life growing up on the banks of the Goulburn River before enjoying a bush tucker inspired lunch.
- Meetings began to develop engagement/education/cultural program with disengaged Koori students at Mooroopna Primary School.
- Gallery Kaiela were engaged to hold a clay turtle activity at the Reedy Swamp Schools Cluster day, creating turtles to include in their annual Turtle Muster while educating students about the importance of turtles as a totem for Yorta Yorta people.

CONNECTING EDUCATION

To provide opportunities for the education sector and the broader community to understand the environment, culture and importance of the area as a valuable asset to appreciate, enjoy and protect.

Numbers of school and student participation during this financial year are lower than the previous year, primarily due to changes of staff during term 3 and 4. The Reedy Swamp Primary School Days were popular as usual, however the Secondary Schools Life at the Lake was less popular, likely due to planning for this occurring later than in the past, giving schools less time to plan for it. Also, some of the data recorded during the year is incomplete, therefore the data represented in this document under reports the true amount of student attendance and student works completed.

<u>VCAL</u>: 53 students participated in activities on their schools adopted reach of the Goulburn and Broken Rivers during terms 1 and 2. Activities included conducting biodiversity audits, asset maintenance, rubbish removal and waste education sessions, GPS plotting habitat hollows, weed removal, plant identification, Waste Education, Indigenous Cultural Education and learning about changes to the rivers since European arrival.

WORKS Students undertook the following works:

- Weed management 716.39 square metres of Moth Vine removed from Jordan's bend
- Asset maintenance Picnic tables were sanded back and lacquered at Jordan's bend
- Revegetation 437 plants* were planted by 8 schools in both pre-prepared Council sites and along their adopted reaches. Approximately 47 students* participated in these planting activities covering approximately 773.22 square metres*. (*indicates that there is data missing with regards to revegetation activities therefore information listed here only reflects the data which was recorded).
- Rubbish removal Rubbish was removed by 150 Primary School students on Schools Clean Up Australia Day, facilitated by Greater Shepparton City Council's Waste Education Officer and supported by RiverConnect.
- Biodiversity Audit Conducted on the Broken River by McGuire Secondary College VCAL students.

Reedy Swamp Primary School Days: 234 students from 6 schools participated in the Reedy Swamp Primary Schools Days across 2 days from 23-24 May. Students rotated through various environmental education sessions provided by 10 different presenters (8 presenters per day), including Turtles Australia, Goulburn Murray Landcare Network, Goulburn Valley Water, Parks Victoria, Kaiela Arts, and Yorta Yorta Nation Aboriginal Corporation. With World Turtle Day being held on 23 May, it was a great opportunity for students to learn about and celebrate our region's local turtles, as well as making their very own clay turtles with Kaiela Arts as part of Gallery Kaiela's Turtle Muster. Schools who participated were Ardmona Primary School, Congupna Primary School, Currawa Primary School, Bourchier Street Primary School, St Lukes Primary School, and Guthrie Street Primary School.

<u>Life at the Lake:</u> 37 VCAL students from two schools, Shepparton High School and McGuire Secondary College, participated in Life at the Lake on 28 May. Students rotated through 5 activities, including Cultural Education with Parks Victoria, learning about animal tracks and scats with Goulburn Murray Landcare Network, identifying water Macroinvertebrates with Goulburn Valley Water, recycling old t-shirts with GSCC Waste Education, and a tour of the lake's wetlands with GSCC Native Open Spaces

<u>Fish release</u>: 30 students participated in a release of native fish species into Victoria Park Lake on 25th May. These were fish which had been living in irrigation channels but needed to be moved due to works being conducted along the irrigation channels. The move and release was facilitated by Goulburn Murray Water and Fisheries Victoria, with students from Verney Road School releasing the fish into the lake.

Kinders: The Education Officer has supported Knight Street Multi-Age Learning Facility in building on their existing Bush Kinder program. This has involved joining in on their Bush Kinder morning sessions, and providing educational sessions regarding the river, its animals and plants and habitat, as well as attendance at tree planting sessions.

Adopt a Reach: Bourchier Street Primary School have re-invigorated their interest in their adopted reach, led by their Year 6 Environmental Leadership students, who visited on 26th June to learn about the area and brainstorm ideas of what activities they would like to do on their reach. Students will begin regular visits to their reach in Term 3 to conduct revegetation, weed and rubbish removal, and learn about the plants and animals which live in their reach.

COMMUNICATION AND CONSULTATION

To provide appropriate, timely information to the community to support the achievement of the overall RiverConnect objectives and to provide well planned consultation processes that will allow the community to effectively influence the development and implementation of the RiverConnect strategic plan.

Overall session increased by ~200, and users by ~300 despite page views and unique page views being down. Bounce and exit rates both increased, but our percentage of new sessions increased. Some of these changes, both positive and negative, may be attributable to the development of RiverConnect's Facebook page and the distribution of information in this way. The Flats and River Access pages continue to be the most viewed pages, aside from the homepage.

A physical community survey was also on display at five locations and an e-survey was made available over six weeks to obtain feedback, receiving 27 responses. A survey designed for NRM agency and organisations was also made available online receiving 7 responses.

Information gathered at events, activities and via survey was incorporated in to the final Strategic Plan in close consultation with RiverConnect partners. The final document is a reflection of community and agency

aspirations for the area, with the process providing detailed insight into projects and activities considered to be priorities for the area. This information regarding priorities will be used to inform annual actions for the program.

RiverConnect 2016 / 2017 Summary

RiverConnect had several fantastic outcomes during the year 2016-2017. The program experienced some interruptions with staff changes throughout the early part of the financial year, which impacted on the delivery of programs in early months, particularly for term 4 of the schools program in 2016.

Despite this, 2016/17 financial year was a strong year for RiverConnect, completing the Strategic Plan, a number of educational activities, building new partnerships and conducting another series of 15 activities through Activities in the Park.

Media coverage continued to be positive with good response to major events, and RiverConnect joined social media with the development of a Facebook group.
